CONFERENCE OBJECTIVES



- Build skills and enhance the ability to incorporate prevention efforts into HIV care and service delivery.
- Explore current, innovative programs and services for special populations, faith communities and advocacy groups.
- Expand participant knowledge and understanding of new HIV treatment modalities and their impact on effective treatment regimens.
- Increase knowledge of prevention and behavioral science theories and their applicability to HIV/STD prevention programs.
- Explore the intersections of sexual risk behavior and associated behavioral and social co-factors that increase susceptibility to HIV/STDs and their applicability to HIV/STD prevention programs.
- Develop strategies for STD and HIV prevention programs to work together by exploring the effects of co-infection.
- Provide information to understand HIV and STD transmission and acquisition in specific populations and discuss targeted prevention strategies to control the epidemic and prevent complications.
- Provide current strategies in HIV and STD care for practitioners serving various populations impacted by HIV, STDs and other co-infections.
- Provide a comprehensive and timely overview of HIV and STD management issues.
- Explore and discuss medical and epidemiological issues related to STDs; expand knowledge base and understanding of new STD laboratory interpretative values and how they relate to disease management and progression; and provide insight into appropriate counseling messages, diagnostics, treatment and the effects on transmission and disease progression as they relate to HIV infection.
- Describe the STD/HIV epidemiology and transmission links affected by the use of club drugs, and explain the behavioral changes that are influenced by these drugs and the impact on the HIV epidemic and the increasing numbers of STDs.

The multidisciplinary nature of the conference program is designed to benefit the broadest range of service providers in fields related to HIV/AIDS and STDs, as well as those working in educational institutions. Keynote Presentations

FEATURED SPEAKERS



GLORIA REUBEN

Over the past decade, Gloria Reuben has been a regular fixture on television, starred in numerous films, performed in a highly-touted off-Broadway production and toured with Tina Turner. Now she's adding recording artist to her credits with the release of her debut solo record, "Just for You."

Many television viewers will remember Reuben for her role as Jeanie Boulet, a health care professional who battled HIV/AIDS on the television series, "ER." She also starred in movies "Time Cop" and "Nick of Time," numerous made-for-TV movies and the off-Broadway production of "The Vagina Monologues."

When she's not performing, Reuben spends time supporting the fight against HIV/AIDS. On World AIDS Day 2005, Reuben was the keynote speaker at the first Black Women's Conference on HIV/AIDS in Los Angeles. In March, 2006 she joined Rights Have No Borders on a trip to Jamaica to promote and support awareness and education for HIV/AIDS and women's health care issues. She also has been an avid supporter of the Elizabeth Glaser Pediatric AIDS Foundation, Planned Parenthood, and ANSA (Artists for a New South Africa).



MERVYN SILVERMAN, M.D., M.P.H.

Mervyn Silverman, M.D., M.P.H. has been in the field of public health for more than 40 years, having held a number of directorships, including director of health for the city and county of San Francisco from 1977 to 1985. During this period he was involved in launching a citywide program to combat the growing AIDS epidemic – a model program that has since been replicated nationwide. He served as president and spokesperson for the American Foundation for AIDS Research and presently serves as chairman of its Global Initiatives Committee. He also was the director of the Robert Wood Johnson AIDS Health Services Program.

He has held several faculty positions, served on the boards of more than 25 organizations, and has authored chapters, articles, editorials, and reviews in a variety of publications. Silverman's most recent awards include the designation as "Public Health Hero" by the University of California, Berkeley, and the Heroes in Medicine Award from the Association of Physicians in AIDS Care.

Silverman received his bachelor's degree from Washington & Lee University, master's of public health from Harvard University and his medical degree from Tulane University School of Medicine. He is president of Mervyn F. Silverman & Associates Inc.

Welcoming Remarks



ERIC E. WHITAKER, M.D., M.P.H.

As director of the Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH), Eric E. Whitaker, M.D., M.P.H., oversees an agency of more than 1,200 employees. Working out of the Chicago and Springfield headquarters, three laboratories and seven regional offices, this staff shares responsibility for improving the health of 12.4 million citizens of Illinois.

Prior to being named the state's public health director in 2003, Whitaker was an attending physician in internal medicine at Cook County Hospital in Chicago and a member of its Collaborative Research Unit, where his interests included HIV/AIDS prevention and minority health, particularly for black males. He helped found

Project Brotherhood: A Black Men's Clinic in Woodlawn where he spent his youth. Housed in Woodland Adult Health Center, which is affiliated with the Cook County Bureau of Health Services, this innovative weekly clinic uses free haircuts to entice African-American men, many of whom die prematurely from preventable diseases, to visit. The clinic promotes a holistic approach to health and wellness that addresses physical as well as mental, vocational and spiritual needs. In 2000, it received the National Association of Public Hospital and Health Systems' highest award.

Whitaker received an undergraduate degree in chemistry from Grinnell College in 1987 and, in 1993, a master's degree from the Harvard School of Public Health and a medical degree from the University of Chicago. He is an assistant professor at Rush Medical College's Department of Medicine and Preventive Medicine and remains clinically active at Project Brotherhood. In 2004, Whitaker was named by *Crain's Chicago Business* as one of the city's "40 under 40" rising stars in business and government. He has received numerous other awards around the country for his outstanding service.



STATE REP. CONSTANCE A. HOWARD

Constance A. "Connie" Howard is currently serving her sixth term representing Illinois' 34th Legislative District, which includes a major portion of the southeast side of Chicago and portions of the villages of Burnham, Calumet City and Lansing in south suburban Cook County. She has served as democratic state central committeewoman of the 1st Congressional District of Illinois since 1984. On a number of occasions, Howard has served as a delegate or alternate delegate to the Democratic National Convention.

Howard's special legislative interests include education, health care (particularly HIV/AIDS in the African-American community), housing, programs for the disabled, neighborhood safety and the environment.

Her seven committee assignments reflect her interest in improving the quality of life for those she serves, and include chairing the Computer Technology Committee and serving as a member of the Elementary and Secondary Education Appropriations Committee, Higher Education Committee and Health Care Availability and Access Committee. She also is a member of the Legislative Reference Bureau Board and several House special task forces.

Howard earned a bachelor's degree and a master's degree from Chicago State University. She is a member of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, the Conference of Women Legislators, Rainbow PUSH Coalition, Chicago Urban League and the Chesterfield Community Council.

Plenary Sessions

FEATURED SPEAKERS



KURT C. ORGANISTA, Ph.D.

Kurt C. Organista, Ph.D., is an associate professor of social welfare at the University of California, Berkeley. He teaches courses on psychopathology, stress and coping, and human diversity competent practices, including social work with Latino populations. He is interested in Latino health and mental health and conducts research in the areas of HIV/AIDS prevention with Mexican/Latino migrant laborers, as well as the treatment of depression in Latinos.

Organista has just completed work on a book on Latino social welfare in the United States and is currently completing a textbook on the same topic.

He currently serves on the editorial boards of the Journal of Ethnic and Cultural Diversity in Social Work, Hispanic Journal of the Behavioral Sciences, and the American Journal of Community Psychology. Organista was recently appointed by former Health and Human Services Secretary Tommy Thompson to the National Office of AIDS Research Advisory Council.



THOMAS FARLEY, M.D., M.P.H.

Thomas Farley, M.D., M.P.H., is chair of the Department of Community Health Sciences at the Tulane University School of Public Health and Tropical Medicine. He is trained as a pediatrician and has served in the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's (CDC) Epidemic Intelligence Service.

He worked for the CDC and the Louisiana Office of Public Health from 1989 to 2000, during which he spent most of that time directing control programs for various infectious diseases, including HIV and other sexually transmitted diseases. He has conducted research and published articles on a wide range of topics, including Legionnaires' disease, prevention of HIV/STDs, youth violence, infant mortality and obesity. He is coauthor of "Prescription for a Healthy Nation."

At Tulane, Farley is currently the director of a CDC-funded Prevention Research Center to study the impact of the physical and social environment on obesity. He teaches courses in public health practices and in policy-based approaches to health promotion. Since Hurricane Katrina, he has been working to rebuild New Orleans in ways that promote health.



PERNESSA C. SEELE

Pernessa C. Seele is founder and chief executive officer of The Balm in Gilead Inc., a non-profit, non-governmental organization with an international mission to improve the health status of people of the African Diaspora by building the capacity of faith communities to address life-threatening diseases, especially HIV/AIDS. Over the past 17 years, the organization's achievements have enabled thousands of faith institutions, both in the United States and throughout Africa, to become leaders in preventing the transmission of HIV by providing comprehensive educational programs and offering compassionate support to all persons affected by HIV/AIDS.

In 2005, the organization expanded its mission to address cervical cancer among black women. Seele is one of the nation's most prominent voices on issues of HIV/AIDS and its effect on African people throughout the world, including African Americans. She has conceived and implemented several innovative programs that are being used nationally and internationally, including The Black Church Week of Prayer for the Healing of AIDS, the premier program of The Balm in Gilead and now the largest AIDS awareness program in the United States targeting the African-American faith community. Launched in 1989, The Black Church Week of Prayer for the Healing of AIDS today reaches more than 5 million African-American churchgoers.

Seele earned a master's degree from Clark Atlanta University. She has received numerous honors and awards, including the Congressional Black Caucus Award in 2000. In 2001, the African American AIDS Policy and Training Institute selected her as a "Hero in the Struggle."



TODD AHLBERG

Filmmaker Todd Ahlberg most recently completed, "Meth," a documentary film illuminating the crystal methamphetamine culture within the gay community (www.methmovie.com). His other documentary film, "Hooked," is an exploration of the "online cruising" phenomenon within the gay culture. The documentary screened at more than 40 film festivals worldwide, and was acquired for distribution by MTV Networks' Logo, as well as Film Threat DVD and Music Video Distributors (MVD).

Ahlberg began his career in production in 1987 at San Francisco Production Group, a leading post and special effects house in San Francisco. In 1997, he co-founded and was chief technical officer of Rotor.net, a Los Angeles-based Internet company. Rotor's technology enabled content creators to invent programming for mass broadcast, live via Internet, while providing a "back channel" so the audience could react to the content in real time, thereby affecting the direction of the show.
