- 3. Latent Tuberculosis Infection and Blood Assays Dean Schraufnagel, MD. This session will include discussion on the benefits and uses of new interferon-gamma blood tests to detect latent tuberculosis infection versus the Mantoux skin test. This session also will provide information on new updates with blood assay testing.
- **4. What's New in Volunteer Programs** Tim Conley, Kim Hunter-Perkins, Matt Roberts, MPH. An overview of public health emergency preparedness volunteer programs, specifically the Emergency System for Advance Registration of Volunteer Health Professionals, Medical Reserve Corps of Illinois, and the Illinois Medical Emergency Response Teams.

This session will discuss tuberculosis as a possible complication of using these medications. A case study will be presented on a patient that developed TB when taking this class of medication.
- **4. One Step Closer** "Informing our Communities" Through Faith-based Initiatives Roxanne Jackson and William Johnson, MD. This session will provide information for our communities about preventative measures and what you need to know about emergency preparedness and HIV/AIDS.


