Lake County



19 communities with **smoke-free** parks

- 37% of Lake County communities
- 7 municipal ordinances
 (5 before Smoke-Free Illinois)
- 9 park district policies covering 12 communities
- 8 have tobacco-free parks
 (2 specifically include e-cigarettes)

Why outdoors?

- Cigarette smoke is heavier than air.
- Smoke only rises when it is hot.
- Without wind, smoke settles and stays in the area.

For Health

- Secondhand smoke is harmful inside or out.
 - "No risk-free level of exposure."
 - Smoke levels outdoors can reach same levels as when smoking is indoors.
 - During exercise, people may increase their oxygen intake by as much as 10 times.
- The Illinois Association of Park Districts
 - "All people should have access to clean, healthy indoor and outdoor areas for exercise and recreation."

For the Environment

- Tobacco is the most littered item in the world.
- Chemicals in filter leak into soil and water.
- Cigarette butts are PLASTIC and not biodegradable.
- Littered butts can start fires.
- Wildlife (and children!) can eat littered butts.



For Healthier Communities

- Change community norms.
- Leaders will role-model healthy choices.
- Break the connection betweens sports & tobacco.

Advocacy Lessons Learned

- Lead with environment and role-modeling for youth
 - Health effects of outdoor smoke less effective
 - Relate to park district's mission statement
 - Include IAPD position statement
- Stress making parks accessible to everyone
 - Including smokers they just can't smoke there
- Ask for tobacco-free, compromise with smoke-free
 - Show samples of tobacco products attractive to youth

Advocacy Lessons Learned



- Collect local data
 - Survey residents and park visitors (with permission)
 - Tally tobacco litter as you pick it up
 - Show the litter to the park boards

• Utilize youth and their energy

- Ask park district to partner on advocacy curriculum with no commitment to a policy
- Youth are responsible for making compelling argument
- Have youth interview park board commissioners to learn and address their unique concerns

Lessons Learned

- Difficulty enforcing is a fear, not a reality
- Park clean ups are like candy for reporters (especially around Kick Butts Day)
- Don't disappear
 - Offer to collect additional data and research if desired
 - Offer to promote new policy with: flyers, posters, signage, radio ads
